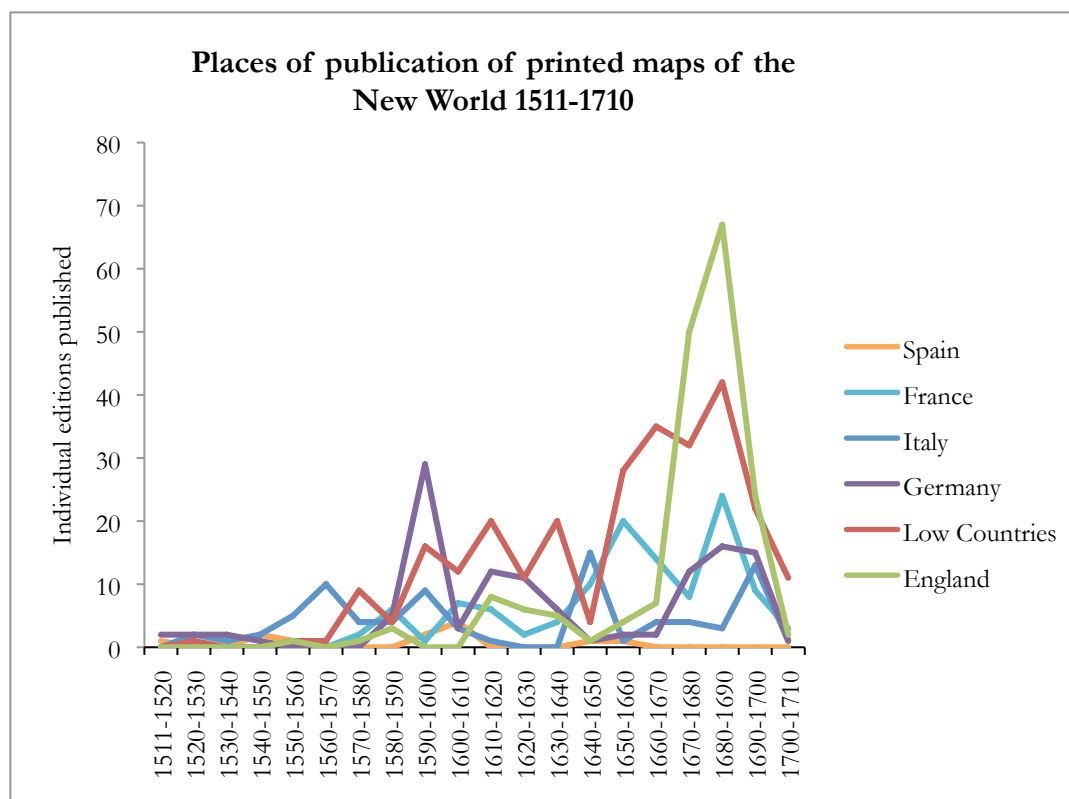

1. Printed maps of the New World published in Europe, 1511-1710 (I also have the data tabulated)

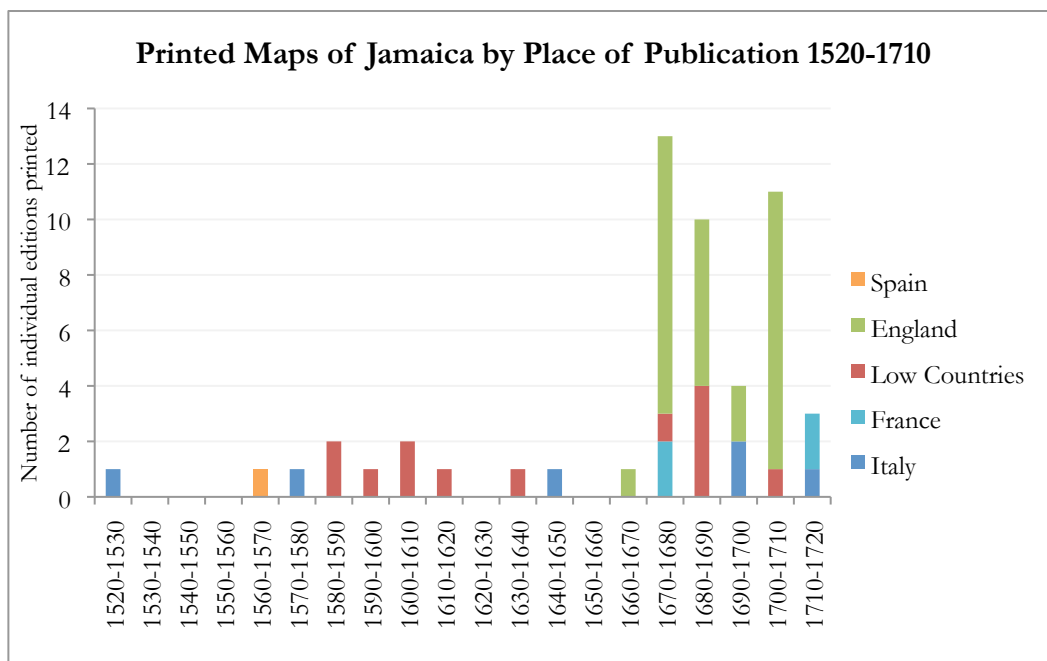

These figures are taken from the Naval Officer's returns which were kept to ensure compliance with the Navigation Acts. Thus, they include only legal exports to England or English colonies. It is evident from merchants' papers that illegal exports sent directly to Europe or via the Dutch entrepôt at Curaçao were very considerable also. The table excludes indigo and cocoa exports in the 1680s as there is no standard unit of measurement in the records.
